About CCP



Ohio's new College Credit Plus program replaces the Post-Secondary Enrollment Options program (PSEO) and all alternative dual enrollment programs. Any college-ready students, grades 7-12 at any of Ohio's public schools, who qualify for college admission may participate in College Credit Plus. This program allows students to earn secondary and college credit at the same time which may reduce the overall costs of, and the amount of time required for, a college education. Accessing the Right Resources for Your Research



Students enrolled in CCP courses and high school teachers teaching CCP courses as adjunct college instructors should have credentials to access the resources available to them through their college's library. If you are attempting to log into your college library's research resources and you are unable to access them, try the following troubleshooting steps:

- Ensure that you are using the proper credentials. Make sure that your PIN, university ID, username, password, and other forms of identification are correct. Double-check by calling the IT department or library at the college through which you are enrolled.
- Try accessing the resources from home or through a network other than your secondary school. If you are able to access the resources from home but not from your secondary school, your school may be blocking these resources. If this is the case, consult your school's IT department.
- As you work to resolve any issues, use the INFOhio resources available to you. INFOhio provides research resources for all of Ohio's PreK-12 students and teachers.

CCP: What You Need to Know to Make Sure You Have Access to the Right Research Resources for You



If you are a college-ready student in grade 7-12 at any of Ohio's public schools and you qualify for admission to an Ohio public institution of higher education (IHE), you are eligible to participate in College Credit Plus, which allows you to earn college and high school credit at the same time. If you participate in CCP, the college or IHE at which you are earning college credit must assign an **advisor** to you. That IHE must schedule a **meeting** between you and your advisor prior to the institution's effective academic no-fault drop course date. This meeting with your advisor may be individual or group, in person or virtual. **Make the most of this meeting.**

Ask the following questions about accessing research resources:

- Do I have a college email address that I need to check? If so, how do I check it?
- Will I have a student ID card? If so, is that what I will use to check out books from the college library?
- Can I view my college library account online?
- What do I need in order to log into electronic resources available through the college's library? If you are
 told that you need a PIN, user ID, campus ID, barcode, or password, find out what yours is and write it down in a safe
 place.
- Will I be able to request print materials from the college's library? If so, where will those print materials be delivered? Where will I need to return them?
- How should I contact a college librarian for research assistance? Find out if the reference, instruction, outreach, or distance learning librarians can work with you through email or online chat. Find out what their hours of availability are.
- If I decide to visit my college's library, where should I park? What do I need in order to log onto the computers? Do I need to pay to print?

CCP: What You Need to Know to Make Sure You and Your Students Have All the Research Resources You Need



All public districts and public institutions of higher education (IHE) must allow college-ready students, grades 7-12, who qualify for college admission to participate in College Credit Plus. If you are a high school teacher who instructs a CCP course as an adjunct, the IHE must provide you with 3-hours of professional development. The IHE will conduct at least one observation of each CCP that you teach during 2015-2016 school year, and then alternating academic years thereafter.

Make the most of your interactions with your IHE by asking the following questions:

- · Can I view my college library account online?
- . What do I need in order to log into electronic resources available through the college's library?
- Will I be able to request print materials from the college's library? If so, where will those print materials be delivered?
 Where will I need to return them?
- How should I contact a college librarian for research assistance? Find out if the reference, instruction, outreach, or
 distance learning librarians can work with you and your students through email or online chat. Find out what their
 hours of availability are.
- Is there a college librarian who can provide research instruction to my CCP students? If so, will I need to bring my class to the college or can the librarian provide these services virtually?
- What information can I share with my school librarian so that my school librarian, the college librarian, and I can work as a team to support my students' learning?



CCP courses delivered online or not on a college campus **may** include students who are not enrolled in the college. This means that you, as the high school teacher/college adjunct, may have some students in your CCP course who have access to the IHE's research resources while other students in the class may not. Keep the following in mind as you prepare:

- All students in the class follow the same course syllabus, use the same text book and materials, aspire to achieve the same learning outcomes and are assessed using
 the same methods as the college course delivered on the college campus.
- All CCP students (enrolled, therefore receiving college and high school credit) must be assessed with the same standard of achievement and held to the same grading standards, regardless of where the course is delivered.
- A student (not enrolled) shall, along with the student's parents, be notified that the student is not earning college credit and would likely be required to retake the
 course upon college enrollment if college credit is desired.

INFOhio has the research resources, including scholarly journal articles, primary source documents, and newspaper articles, that all of your students can access and use to be successful in your CCP course.

CCP: What You Need to Know to Support Your CCP Students and Teachers in Their Research



Each public school must annually coordinate with each public and participating private institution of higher education (IHE) within a 30 mile radius to present a dedicated CCP event to students and parents prior to March 30. This event may include multiple high schools within a district and multiple districts. **Take an active role in this event** to help ensure that your students have access to all of the research resources available to them.

The College Credit Plus program gives you a unique opportunity to collaborate with your cooperating IHE's academic library. You can improve your students' transition to college by giving them an academic library research experience while they're still in high school. Many of Ohio's academic libraries have First Year Experience Librarians or Outreach Librarians who will work with high school librarians and teachers to provide Ohio's high school seniors and CCP students with an introduction to the college research experience. To find an academic library in your area that provides outreach to high school and CCP students, visit INFOhio's guide to Academic Library Research Visits for High School Students.



You may be asked by your school to be a "facilitator" for a CCP course. Facilitators oversee students taking online CCP courses while at the high school. Facilitators are not considered course instructors and do not have adjunct status with the IHE or access to the IHE library resources. However, you can still help your CCP students using INFOhio resources. Additionally, you may want to contact an academic librarian at the IHE to collaborate on providing research instruction to your CCP students.

Students enrolled in CCP courses and high school teachers teaching CCP courses as adjunct college instructors should have credentials to access the resources available to them through your school library, through INFOhio, and through their IHE's library. If students or teachers are attempting to log into their IHE library's research resources and are unable to access them, try the following troubleshooting steps:

- Work with the cooperating IHE to ensure that your users have and are using the proper credentials. Double-check by calling the IT department or library at the
 cooperating IHE.
- 2. If your users are able to access the IHE library's electronic resources from home but not from your secondary school, your school may be blocking these resources. If this is the case, work with your school's IT department to make the IHE's resources available to your users.

Introduction to the Academic Library Research Experience

Improve the transition for your students by giving them an academic library research experience while they're still in high school.

Many of Ohio's academic libraries have First Year Experience Librarians or Outreach Librarians who will work with high school librarians and teachers to provide Ohio's high school seniors with an introduction to the college research experience.
